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An Important Note About Room Capacity

- NEFFA thanks the Mansfield Fire Dept. and the Building Inspector for the generous designated capacities of the rooms that we are using in 2014. We expect few circumstances in which demand for seats will exceed the limits for any of the events which are scheduled. Nevertheless, we remind you that:
- The capacity of each room will be posted outside of each room.
- The number of chairs placed in each room will be equal to the room capacity.
- For events that are likely to draw a large audience, there will be room monitors stationed at the entrance who will not allow any more people into a room once the capacity is reached.
- If you are not allowed into an event because the room capacity has been reached, please be understanding and cooperate with the room monitor.

Festival Notes

- Please wear only clean, non-marking shoes which have not been worn outside (such as clean sneakers or soft-soled dance shoes) in the dance halls and on the auditorium stages.
- There is no on-street parking associated with the Festival – avoid frustration by parking at the school lots or other designated parking areas. Shuttle buses run regularly between all the satellite parking lots and the Mansfield schools throughout the weekend. See maps for parking locations.
- **Park at your own risk.** The New England Folk Festival Association, its agents, servants and employees do not assume any liability for any damage, theft or other loss to your vehicle or your property that occurs as a result of parking your vehicle in any of the lots that are designated for Festival use. Neither overnight parking nor camping is permitted on school grounds or in any of the lots used for Festival Parking. Observe the designated NEFFA parking signs.

- Access Guides for attendees with disabilities are available in the Lobby and at the Information Table. all times. Events coded F are designed for you and your children to participate in together. However, any Festival Committee member who finds a small child alone will bring him/her to the Information Table to await his/her parent. Probably no one person can answer all your questions, but we'll help you find the right place to ask.
- NEFFA encourages all dancers to exercise care in their dancing. The New England Folk Festival Association, its agents, servants and employees do not assume any liability for any injuries that may be sustained due to the condition of the halls or the dancing.
- NEFFA maintains a **Lost & Found** at the **Information Table**. Before you leave the Festival, check at the Information Table to report belongings you have mislaid. The item may already be there. If not, and it is found at the close of the Festival, it will be mailed to you, if we have your name and address. If you discover after you leave the Festival that you have lost something, you may call (617) 299-1590 to see if the item was found, or visit the Lost & Found page at the NEFFA website to report your missing item. Items not claimed by July 1 will be donated to charity, if appropriate.
- Please watch your personal belongings. The New England Folk Festival Association, its agents, servants and employees do not assume any liability for any damage, theft or loss to your personal property that occurs as a result of attendance at the Festival.
- NEFFA maintains a festival phone number. Please ask at one of Information Tables for the number. This number will connect you with the Information Table staff during the festival. We will assist you in any way we can. **If you have an emergency please call 911.** Since the Festival is so large, we can't guarantee we'll be able to locate an attendee, but we will do our best.

- NEFFA does not permit Festival-goers to bring dogs or other animals onto the Mansfield School properties during the Festival, except animals which are present for the purpose of assisting someone with a disability. Dogs found alone on the Mansfield School properties will be reported to the Mansfield dog officer.
- This is an all-volunteer Festival, so be sympathetic if the program gets off schedule or someone goofs. We invite your patience and hope you will join the fun and friendliness.
- **Please smile** if one of our safety volunteers asks you to move out of a jammed doorway, or not to sit in the bleacher aisles. Public safety laws demand that these conditions be addressed at all times.

Smoking is not allowed anywhere on the school property.

- Festival craftspeople, merchants and those who serve food come at their own expense to share their interests with others. Do consider buying items that are for sale, but remember that the transactions are entirely between you and the vendors.
- Food must be eaten in the Cafeteria (Middle School), or in the Bistro (High School), and is not permitted in any of the other rooms or hallways of the High School or Middle School. Feel free to enjoy your food outdoors, if the weather permits. Sealed water bottles, such as sports bottles, are permitted, but must remain sealed when not in use. Please consider taking home your water bottles, etc. to recycle at home. Thank you.

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HISTORICAL NEFFA

NEFFA BEGAN in 1944 as the "Fall Folk Festival," and here we are in 2014 gathering together again for music, dance, and other

traditions. Every year in between, save in 1948 when the Festival was delayed to its current time in spring, saw a Festival. We're up to 70 years! Born at the Boston YWCA, jumping from Worcester, Medford. New Hampshire, and Rhode Island until settling for decades in Natick and now Mansfield, the event was shaped by giants of the folk scene including Ralph Page, Ted Sannella, and Bob McQuillen. Though they are with us no longer, their legacy lives on in photos, songs, dances, and the memories of the people they touched.

In preparing for the 70th NEFFA Festival, we asked some of our attendees. participants and performers, what the Festival has meant to them. Some responded with memories, some with poetry, and others still with hopes for the future. All expressed their delight at being a part of this community we all know and love! If this is your first time at the Festival, Welcome! We hope you may find yourself coming back for decades and decades to come.



I've been writing a poem about NEFFA over the years, adding a stanza now and then. I have been to NEFFA every year of my life, except for two when we lived in Utah. However, even though I missed two and I am 58, this is my 57th NEFFA because my mom went in 1955 when she was pregnant with me. My parents, Gloria and Irving Kaufman, were part of the dance community in the '40s, '50s and '60s. All three of my kids, Jeff, Rose, and Alice Kaufman, are part of the current dance community. My wife and I had our second date at the Scout House in Concord, and also had our wedding there.



If I wanted to show a foreigner a piece of Americana that was not created in Hollywood or Madison Avenue, I'd take him to NEFFA.
